# CHALLENGER KOSOVO CAMOUFLAGE

One of the few times that the British Challenger tank has been employed in action was during the intervention by Nato into the conflict between the Serbians and the Albanians circa 1998-1999.

The Challenger was deployed as part of a multi-national force called KFOR which was short for Kosovo Forces. the Challengers were clad in a Bronze Green and Nato Black camouflage.

If you build a lot of UK armor there aren't many choices for color schemes, basically olive drab or bronze green. with the exception of the sand yellow for Operation Granby (Desert Storm) and the Cheiftains of the BAOR (British Army of the Rhine) that were stationed in Berlin and sported their own brand of urban camouflage. The camouflage I'm depicting on my Trumpeter 1/35 Challenger is the UK's attempt at a disruptive pattern. The colors are several shades of green finishing up with Tamiya's Nato Green and Nato Black. The base coat darker green is Tamiya IJN Green over a black primer.



Being tha anglophile that I am I have two Tamiya Challenger 2's, two Tamiya Challenger 1's and an RFM Challenger 2 and Challenger 2 TES, The RFM Challenger 2 TES is close to 85% done. The Challenger is just one of those machines I find fascinating like the Eurofighter Tornado. To do the camouflage I outlined the pattern listed in the Trumpeter instructions on the tank with a fine point sharpie. As it is a hard

edge camouflage I outlined the sharpie lines with black paint and thin filled in with my airbrush with Nato black. This was post highlighting of the green.



I didn't highlight the black as I planned to use the oil dot method to weather the tank. It has been some time since I'd built a Trumpeter kit but as this is the less expensive of several options and came with a dozer blade that will easily mount to the Tamiya kit I am happy with the result.

# Sprue Recycling by William Zych

What are you doing with those sprues when you are done with your project? I cut out and keep any parts not used and these go in the spare bin, but what about the rest? At the very least let's hope they are ending up in the recycle bin and not the landfill.

Sure, you keep some for making antennas, maybe lights or even bottles and other bits for your dioramas. Paint stirrers are another option to get the settled pigment moving from the bottom of that Tamiya bottle.

Here are some other options to consider before you toss them out.

1. Make Filler Putty

Polystyrene, the polymer in modeling kits, is an inexpensive and malleable plastic dissolves readily in volatile solvents, such toluene aka methyl benzene, which are the active ingredients in plastic cements and modeling glues.

To make the custom plastic putty, cut up your sprues into very small pieces. Smaller pieces help dissolve better. Put the plastic sprue bits into a glass jar. Then, add the plastic cement by drop until the plastic is completely dissolved.

Sprue Goo makes a good filler for gaps or can even be poured into a mold to create a custom part.

### 2. Figure Bases

Cut a few sprues the same length and glue them together to give you a unique base for a figure.

3. Terrain, Buildings, Urban Scenery

Cut small or get a cheap coffee grinder to turn them into small pieces to scatter about as stone or rocks or maybe a fence or tank barricade. Use uncut sprues as a frame for a building that can be covered with other material for walls.

### 4. Recast into a Plastic Card

The inspiration for this article was an article that I read talking about taking your sprues and melting them into sheets that can be used for just about anything. Walls for a building, inexpensive diorama bases or anything else that you can think of or do with purchased sheet styrene. The process is straightforward and will just need a few things.

The big thing is a waffle iron with flat griddle plates. You can find these at Goodwill or Savers for less than \$20. The other item that you will need is parchment paper as a liner so that the melted plastic does not stick to your iron. I also acquired a metal plate to reduce the thickness of the sheet created by reducing the space in the waffle iron.



The process that I use is starts with a sheet of parchment paper, then a pile of cut up sprue. I use longer pieces as borders and fill in with smaller. Don't worry about not getting enough. If a hole is left behind, you can always add more and heat again.

Another sheet of parchment paper on top of this, then my metal plate for additional weight and close the lid. Don't use high temperature for this. I have the iron set to a low temperature and just leave it running and come back to it after an hour or so and I have a flat plate.



I do this outdoors for several reasons. Melting plastic gives off fumes that can be bad in an enclosed space and for safety reasons. A spill of melted plastic out on the concrete patio is no big deal and in the unlikely event of fire or meltdown of that old waffle iron.

Don't worry about missed spots, just add more sprue and run again.

I hope this gets everyone's creative juices flowing and maybe generates some additional thoughts for recycling those sprues. I will end with an offer to all, if you provide sprues, I will create you a sheet if you are interested.





April 5 I had the privilege of making my first visit to the Route 66 Model Expo in Tulsa, Oklahoma. The show was held at Park Church of Christ, a large church with several buildings. The model exhibit tables were set up on a basketball court. The day was cold, rainy, and windy but this did not ruin the show. There was still a good turnout and over 400 models were there to be seen, and a full vendor area with over 50 tables. There was also a spacious area set up for the awards presentation. This is quite a nice venue.

The host Tulsa Modelers Forum billed this show as the future of model shows. It was truly different in a number of ways from any other show I have attended. The show had an exhibit format entrants were encouraged to bring up to 20 models and choose up to four of them to be judged with a flat entry fee of \$20. Judging was done in a gold silver - bronze style. Each model judged received written feedback from the judges. Models not entered for judging were still considered for special awards. Models were not arranged on the display tables by category, rather each Modeler's work was displayed all together in a spot on a table just for his/hers. The model collections were identified with the Modeler's name. So yes, judges did know whose models they were judging.

Emphasis at this show was very much on presentation of the models. Some of the displays were quite elaborate and attractive.

# ASMS was represented by myself and Mike Lamar. Mike took four 1/72 Ki-84s, which he selected for judging, and six 1/48 FW-190s. All four of the Ki-84s received gold and his whitewash painted FW-190 received the Best Axis Aircraft special award I took my Bondo build 1/48 Mystere IV, my vacform 1/48 PZL 46, and a 1/144 DC-3. All three received bronze.



Hugo Garcia attended all the way from Edinburg and won Best Auto with his piece that was Best of Show at River-Con. Dana Mathes attended from San Antonio and won Best Armor with a Lanchester armored car and also the Court Hughes Memorial award.. Best of Show went to a Gundam Mk. V built by Luke Hess.
