




Monthly Meeting Presentations:

Atlantis' US Combat Task Force Fleet by Ben Morton



Atlantis Models has, for a while now, been re-releasing various manufacturer's older kits. As the new purveyor of some of the older Aurora, Revell, Monogram and Lindberg molds these kits really are tugging at the ole nostalgia thread for many of us.

One of these offerings is a collection of warships from the mid to late 1940's to the 1950's: U.S. Combat Task Force Fleet. This kit began life as a Renwall kit in the late 1950's. It has been passed around a bit (Pyro to Life Like to Lindberg) and now finds itself among the multitude of offerings from Atlantis Models.



The kit consists of twelve warships. There is an aircraft carrier, a fast battleship, several cruisers and destroyers as well as a few auxillary ships.

One more modernera ship is represented by the SSB(N) Patrick Henry, a fleet ballistic missile submarine. or, 'Boomer' to fans of Tom Clancy's writings.

U.S.S. Sullivans - destroyer

U.S.S. Canberra - heavy cruiser

U.S.S. Hornet - aircraft carrier

U.S.S. Galveston - light cruiser

These kits, as one might imagine from the scale (1/1200th), are thin on details with many features(anchor chains, anchors, anti-aircraft guns, etc.) being molded into the parts.






That makes them fairly easy to build and this collection could be a great beginner kit for any budding ship modeler out there. Allowing for the age of the molds there is a smattering of flash and mis-shapen parts to contend with... nothing that is insurmountable.

These ship models are fun to build and while the lack of detail might put you off there is lots to like about this collection of warships. Any number of ideas sprang to mind as I completed my fleet. Among those are an underway replenishment diorama, table-top war gaming, a group build, or my favorite, a 3D version of the game 'Battleship'. Lastly, these petite models might make good tests beds for anyone contemplating their first foray into a resin sea scape diorama. Better to 'melt' one of these into the resin pour than your painfully completed 1/72nd Schnell-boot.







USS Hornet

Atlantis Models does supply a small decal sheet with ship numbers and name plates as well as complete carrier deck markings for the U.S.S. Hornet. An additional bonus treat is the inclusion of some box art (actually bottom of the box art) to help with displaying your completed fleet.

Luftwaffe fighters: Combat on All fronts Dart 2 A review by Floyd Werner

For those of us who are Luftwaffe fans and historians, the Falke Eins page has been a wealth of knowledge for years. The webmaster is Neil Page who has now taken some of that information and published it in a beautiful square bound magazine with 130 high quality pages.

The focus of this book is the fighters, but it is not limited to single engine fighters. I found this refreshing. The cover art is a gorgeous painting of a Heinz Bar's FW-190 doing a low pass over a B-17 'Miss Quachita'. This sets the tone of the rest of the volume. The list of acknowledgements reads like a who's who of Luftwaffe research.

There are plenty of previously unpublished photos, some in color, that will appeal to the modeler and historian alike. Some pictures are full page pics while others are half page. The quality of the photos is exceptionally clear and very useful.

Sample chapters include Photo Profiles and personal accounts, as well as, unit history summaries. The very first chapter was intriguing to me and deals with the morale and fighting spirit of the fighter arm. This covers from the early years to the end of the war. It is eye opening and very well written. This is an insight that isn't looked at very often. Why would they keep flying? This chapter answers that question.





Fighter Pilot training is covered in the next chapter. Again, this is an often overlooked chapter in the Luftwaffe history. A special panel on training in JG-107 is interesting. Also the Dewoitine D.520 in Luftwaffe service is covered as is Wanderzirkus Rosarius.

A photo essay of the FW-190 on the Eastern Front is next up. A quick overview of JG-1 is interesting along with the new photos in this section.

The Gruppe did not return their first victory until September 14, 1943 - airborne on a late evening patrol over the mouth of the Danube, Fw. Karl Gunselmann (11./NJG 6) intercepted a Soviet mine-laying DB-3. According to his own account, St.K Hptm. Bauer was surprised enough to undertake discreet checks, concerned that the downed twin could have been a Romanian or even a Luftwaffe Bf 110.

The Allied bombing campaign against the Romanian oil fields grew in intensity during the spring and early summer of 1944. By day it was led by the huge forces available to the USAAF 15th AF - the first B-24 Liberators flew against Romanian targets on April 4 and Romanian targets on April 4 and IV/NJG 6 chaimed three downed, one falling to Staffelkapitän 10/NJG 6 Oblt. Hans Meyer. But as the bombing campaign was stepped up US fighter escorts inflicted heavy losses – on June 10, 1944, Kommandeur Lütje's 'Bofu' (Bordfünker) Ofw. August 2007 (Bordfünker) Ofw. August Bogumil shot down two 82 FG P-38 Lightnings with his twin MG 81s, but in the resulting engagement

Night fighters of the East are up next. This is not only the twin engine Bf-110 but the He-111 and Ju-88 used in the night fighter roll. Some really unique photos are in this section that are sure to motivate the modeler.

IG-27 is known for its roll in the desert of North Africa, however, the unit soldiered on until the end of the war. A chapter dedicated to its Defense of the Reich from August 1943 to May 1944 is up next. This unit participated in both Schweinfurt/Regensberg raids. There are plenty of Bf-109s in this section for those who love the airplane like I do.

Chapter 10

Down in the Drink Lt. Walter Seiz 3./JG 53

Flying a combat aircraft during the Second World War could be a hazardous business – even when the enemy was nowhere in sight. Flying a routine escort mission over the island of Malta

in sight. Flying a routine escort mission over the island of Malas in the Mediterranean one sunny March morning in 1942, Lt. Walter Seiz abruptly found himself fighting for survival high above the clear blue occan. He tells the story in his own words.

"I was aithorne in company with Uffz. Heinrich Blum on an escort sortie for a roce flight ower Malas on March 14, 1942, at 08:15. We overflew the island at an aititude of around 5,800m. The Aufkläter roces aircraft, a Ju 88, was several hundred metres below us. As we passed over the southern constitue, the Ju 82 curved into a torn. Up to that point the sortie had run on rails. There was nothing to report. No Spitifries. No enemy fighters had put in an appearance.

I also banked into a turn. Suddenly 16th a joit through my Me 109. There was a 'metallic noise. I knew instinctively that my Rottenflieger had just collided with my machine. His tail assembly had sliced through my port wing. My Me 109 went straight down.

with my machine. His rall assembly had sileed through my port wing My Mei 109 went straight down in a headlong dive. The machine began to rotate rapidly around the longitudinal axis. The speciometer was showing more than 800km/h and the slipstream was whisting and howing around the enopy. Only with the force of desperation was I able to jettion the canopy. Now I couldn't get the seat belts undone and the sea was literally racing towards me.

Even today I wonder how I remained so calm. I managed to get the belts off at an altitude of around 2,500m and due to the centrifugal 2,500m and due to the centrifugal forces was literally catapulted flow the cockpit. I dropped like a stone, tumbling and spinning down, so that all my pockets were torn open and the distress flag, the tin cans of Schokolade, the flames and the dye bage flew away. I managed to hold on to a few flare rounds and packa of dye and to snap my pockets back up. It appeared to take ages for the speed at which I was falling to reduce to a normal rate of descent. Everything was happening very fast but it seemed like an eternity to me. Suddenly I had a thought—how high was IP Estimating that I was at about 1,000 to 1,200m I started to feel for the ripcord handle of my chute. Another moment of punic; where was the handle? The

frantic twisting motion had caused it to slip backwards. Finally, I had the cool metal handle in my had and tugged it. When the parachute silk billowed open with the characteristic rattling sound, there was the obligatory hard joit and I was suspended in mid-sir at 100 500m above the blue sea with a sieue of the copar of Maln, which view of the coast of Malta which

Below me I caught sight of my Messenchmitt as it plunged into the Mediterranean in a geyser of water. Shortly before coming down in the water I checked the parachure lock. Damn, it had turned inwards and so I could not unbuckle the harness. Landing in the water still suspended under the canopy seemed to me to be far too rhisy as it would be very easy to get caught under the canopy lines. I pulled myself up with my







•AH-1F Cobra • B-25J Mitchell • F4U-4 Corsair • P-38G Lightning




